

On 10th May our Annual Plant Sale went well. The weather was warm and sunny - great for attracting people and selling plants. Fortunately we were set up in the shade of the tree in the village square. Many of the customers, who were complimentary regarding the quality of the plants, had been at previous sales and looked forward to seeing what we had available. The plants from members, and the bedding plants from Parklea Branching Out, sold well. It is also an opportunity to hand out flyers telling of future events and convincing people that they are gardeners - the garden plants they have are being well looked after and flourishing, so they must be doing something right.

In June, an afternoon outing was held to Parklea Branching Out (PBO), a supportive gardening project in Port Glasgow, was held. Fourteen members met up with Sharon and Jon at Parklea for a very interesting talk on the history and development of PBO, a look behind the scenes, tea/coffee and scones and a chance to buy some plants. The facilities were excellent and the weather was good. One of our members had noted the great workshop facilities available to the clients for building planters and so forth, and will donate a vice for their use. Parklea Branching Out is keen to promote links with local groups, so we've recommended it to Bonnie Bishopton, a group dedicated to making Bishopton brighter, and to

the staff in Morar, the local care home. Our stall at Bridge of Weir Gala Day was very successful, despite the weather being showery and at times turning to heavy rain. There was a good atmosphere, with plenty of stalls providing cake, tombola and entertainment – and people were willing to buy the plants we had taken along. We also gave away some seedlings and small plants; having photographs of the full-grown plants and examples of the seedheads generated some useful and interesting chat.

The BoWHS Gardening Club Annual Festival will take place on Saturday 16th August, in Bridge of Weir Parish Church. This year we will be hosting a photo competition open to Nurseries and Primaries 1-3 at BoW Primary School. As the Festival takes place during the school holidays we are hoping this provides an opportunity for mums, dads, grandparents etc to support the children in engaging with wildlife and gardening – and get them outdoors!

The Festival/Coffee Morning will be open between 10am and 2pm, with tea/coffee and home baking as well as various exhibits of plants, flowers and produce available to view in addition to the children's photos. There will be a plant stall with many home-grown plants available. Come along to enjoy the exhibits, have a cuppa and vote for your favourite photo!

Overcoming Adversity in the Mearns

Traditionally, community growing groups throughout Aberdeenshire have been able to receive an annual allocation of bedding plants provided by the Council for planting in public spaces in their locality. Sadly, at the end of last year, this valuable provision was suddenly withdrawn due to Council budget cuts.

By coincidence, *Kincardineshire Development Partnership* had just facilitated the setting up of the *Kincardine and Mearns Growing Network* encompassing all community growing groups in this southernmost part of Aberdeenshire. Under this initiative, several groups in the Mearns (south of Stonehaven), have willingly come together to help each other by working on joint projects, and sharing their resources and knowledge. Among these groups are three SGF members – the Caim at Luthermuir, Johnshaven Community Garden and Brighter Bervie.

That's an awful lot of names and organisations to swallow, but basically what has emerged is a bunch of enthusiastic volunteer gardeners who care about the attractiveness and ecology of their local environment and are determined not to let Council cutbacks detract from these vitally important features.

The newly formed network quickly set about the task of developing a scheme to replace the loss of their annual plant allocations from the Council. This alternative scheme had to be ready for implementation before the 2025 growing season. Adopting the title Grow Mearns. funding of £1215 was obtained from the Communities Mental Health and Wellbeing Fund. This money was used to purchase 4,300 plug plants and a ton of peat free compost. The Milltown Community in Arbuthnott. which caters for adults with special needs, was keen to participate in the project and has provided the use of a polytunnel, cold frames and hands-on help. Together with volunteers from the network, the plug plants were potted up, brought on and watered by folk at Milltown, then distributed to the various participating communities and planted out in public spaces,

Originally launched by the SGF at Gardening Scotland back in 2005, the 'Pallets & Planters Challenge' has become a standout attraction, drawing growing interest year after year. Now firmly established as a highlight of the annual Scone Palace Garden Fair, the Challenge continues to flourish.

This year saw a rise in the number of entrants, with participants showcasing a wide range of creative and imaginative designs. Visitors were drawn to the displays throughout the event, with the 'People's Choice' vote proving incredibly popular—so much so that all 1,000 voting slips were used up on the first day!

One of the most heartening aspects of the Challenge is the diverse range of participants. Whether it's students, community groups, schools, castle gardeners, clubs, or individuals, it's encouraging to see people willing to take part. The sheer variety of creative themes and innovative ideas on display—reflected in the selection of plants, use and reuse of materials, and the structural layout—brings the show ground to life.

While creating a pallet or planter display takes planning, time, and effort, the process is truly enjoyable—and even better, entry is free! For some, participating in the SGF Challenge has even served as a stepping stone toward entering the Scottish Garden

Kilmacolm Horticultural Society

Kilmacolm Horticultural Society is one of the oldest surviving Societies in Scotland today. It all began in 1879 when a group of people came together with a mutual love and respect for horticultural matters.

In the Statistical Account of Scotland Kilmacolm was described as "an irregular cluster of barns, byres and cartsheds tagged on to the end of of low thatched cottages, with a Kirk and a public house on opposite sides of the road, plus a school and a smiddy". Now Kilmacolm is a flourishing mixture of large houses, built by the shipyard owners and businessmen of Glasgow; more recently the formation of small estates extended the village and the commuting generation enlarged after the M8 was born.

The Society closed only during the war years. One Flower Show Day was delayed due to the funeral following the tragic death of Diana, Princess of



Wales. One traditional Coffee Morning and Plant Sale was delayed due to the coronation of King Charles III.

The traditions enjoyed over many years still endure: Winter Lectures, Annual Flower Show, Fundraising Coffee Morning, but more recently the popular Annual Plant Sale has become a welcome event. Summer outings have re-commenced following a break during Covid. Our membership fluctuates with the passing of elderly members, but increases with the joining of younger people showing enthusiasm for gardening knowledge.

The Nairn Schools Pallet Garden Challenge 2025

We were transported from the Bare Necessities from The Jungle Book to Family Island, during the judging of this year's pallet garden competition, organised by Nairn Gardening Club. Family Island is a free, offline, farming adventure game where you build a life on a deserted island. This had provided the inspiration for the entry from Rosebank Primary in Nairn. The main body of the pallet was filled with a lush display of plants, all of which had been grown from seed. These includ-

ed nasturtiums, radishes, cornflowers and French marigolds. A delphinium and sunflower towered over this display and introduced some height into the design. Seaweed and shells on one side conveyed the island theme. Family photos had been attached to netting at the back of the pallet along with a small poster illustrating 'Ohana'. In Hawaiian, 'Ohana' translates to family but with a broader meaning that includes extended family. It signifies that family means no one is left

behind or forgotten. I am sure that this concept had been applied during the construction of the pallet garden by the P3 class, who all showed great enthusiasm for the project.

In contrast, the Bare Necessities provided excellent scope for the jungle themed pallet from Millbank Primary. This school has a very active and popular gardening club which is over-subscribed with young enthusiasts. They had also grown their plants from seed with considerable success. Their garden featured food plants which included tomatoes, rhubarb and radishes. In addition, they had included a contorted willow, Persicaria 'purple fantasy' and a large Coca Cola plant (Artemi-
